

Population aging will have permanent, far-reaching impacts

- Labor force growth has already slowed; shortages have emerged.
- Dampened economic growth may follow from slower labor force growth.
- Public budgets will be impacted by different spending pressures and by changes to income/spending of the population.
- Communities and public institutions must figure out how to provide care for aging population that does not have the personal resources to pay for it.

The rapid transition to an older state is already occurring


Total Population Age 65 Years and Older Minnesota 1950-2050


Transition to an older state accelerates between 2010 and 2030


Minnesota is permanently transitioning to an older state





When will we feel the impact of population aging?




Minnesota is close to the national average in its age distribution



Percent of the Population Age 65 Years and Older, 2020

- U.S. 16.8%
- Minnesota 16.6%
- Utah (youngest state) 11.7%
- Maine (oldest state) 21.8%

Rural Minnesota tends to be much older, on average, than metropolitan areas




Percent of the Population Age 65 Years and Older, 2020


49% percent of older adults in the state live in the 7-county metro


An example from rural Minnesota: Aitkin County

Lower wages exacerbate workforce shortages for healthcare support workers




The Older Adult BIPOC population remains relatively small



Most older adults live in owned, single-family homes


Number of Units in Structure

- 182,935 (31%) of older adult households are housing costburdened


Rates of disability increase quickly in older age





Income Distribution of Older Adult Households (65+)




Household Income of 2 Person Households Householder Age 65+, 2021

- Among the most pressing issues is how Minnesota will care for its older adults.






U.S. data: Wealth of Older Adult Households
