 - A. Appropriation for DNR Aggregate Mapping: To ensure the availability of aggregate resources for the future, local governments need aggregate resource maps. The proposal is \$1M over 10 years to complete the entire state. The rate of mapping is scalable depending funding levels.
 - B. <u>Reclamation</u>: Aggregate mining is a temporary land use. There is greater public awareness and concern over the reclamation of non-metallic mines. To address this concern:
 - Audit the use of the Aggregate Material Removal; Production Tax Minn. Statute §298.75 Sub. 7 (c)(3) to determine how funds are being used.
 - Update the DNR Reclamation Handbook (1992). This provides technical information for RGUs regarding the reclamation of aggregate pits and managing of permitting programs.
 - Establish a Nonmetallic Mining and Reclamation Advisory Committee. Board members our represent economic, scientific, and cultural viewpoints related to nonmetallic mining and reclamation, modelling WI Advisory Committee established by Wis. Admin. Code Ch. NR 135.51.
 - C. <u>Comprehensive Planning</u>: To plan and preserve aggregate resources for future use, comprehensive plans and ordinances would benefit from:
 - Specifying criteria related to aggregate resources that need to be addressed in comprehensive planning, such as expected population growth with respect to aggregate deposits and expected demand/requirements for aggregates to meet needs.
 - Including within existing the list of forms of control in MN Statute §394.25 "mining districts."
