HEALTH CARE BACKGROUND

Most of the 17 nonprofit institutions that are members of the Minnesota Private College Council (MPCC) focus on preparing students to contribute to the future health care workforce. Yes, the number of graduates is impressive. But so is the nature of how we educate our students, preparing them well to communicate and collaborate — critical skills in an increasingly complex health care environment.

- At the **bachelor's level**, MPCC institutions award 37% of the state total of all health-related degrees (1,180 of 3,158) see table that follows with examples of bachelor's degrees.
 - \circ Health care-focused bachelor's degrees rank 2^{nd} in popularity at MPCC institutions.
 - Majority of our colleges offer health care majors.
 - MPCC institutions award **45% of all baccalaureate nursing degrees** in the state; this includes nursing completion program degrees.
- Whether their undergraduate majors are within health care or not, our undergraduates are well equipped to go on to **pursue advanced degrees in health care.** For example, the University of Minnesota Medical School's incoming class in 2013 included graduates from 13 of Minnesota's private nonprofit colleges.
- As for the degrees we award at the **master's level**, MPCC institutions award 38% of health-related degrees in the state (550 of 1,437) see table that follows with examples of both master's and doctorate degrees.
- We offer unique opportunities for primary care providers:
 - Nurse practitioner programs are established at The College of St. Scholastica and St. Catherine University, with a combined total of about 100 graduates a year; a new program is being added at Augsburg College that is expected to graduate about 25 students a year.
 - **Physician assistant** programs are established at Augsburg College and St. Catherine University, with around 25 graduates a year; new programs are being added at Bethel University and The College of St. Scholastica that are expected to each graduate about 25 students a year.
 - o A new Nurse midwifery program is being added at Bethel University.
