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# **BOSA's Position on Educator Licensing**

The Board of School Administrators has worked collaboratively with the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) and the Board of Teaching (BOT) to reflect on best practices related to educator licensure. BOSA has met with MDE and BOT leadership to review recommendations provided by the Office of the Legislative Auditor (OLA) as well as additional recommendations regarding the creation of a Professional Standards Board.

The Board of School Administrators (BOSA) was not the focus of the OLA report and mentioned as an entity to be considered if licensing activities were consolidated under BOT. BOSA would like to emphasize that it operates very efficiently, effectively and collaboratively as an autonomous body under the current legislative structure and prefers no change to its current operations.

- The OLA addressed key areas of concern and areas in need of repair pertaining to BOT and MDE. BOSA's position is that it may be beneficial for the Legislative Committee to focus on addressing the key issues mentioned in the OLA report before considering changes such as, one professional standards board.
- The administrative education associations prefer no change to BOSA. Current operations work well for the administrators served through BOSA and MDE licensing staff and they have testified in support of BOSA's current structure working well for their members.
- In 2001, education organizations such as MASA, MASE, MCEA, MESPA, MASSP supported the legislative decision to establish a peer review board to represent administrators in the state of Minnesota.
- BOSA operates with the highest professional standards and legislators have enacted legislation to hold administrators in Minnesota to that same standard.
- BOSA provides strong oversight of discipline and ethical matters that are brought to the Board's attention.
- University preparation programs prefer no change to BOSA. Preparation programs are held to high standards and are reviewed by a peer review committee on a 5-year rotation to assure they are in compliance with current law.
- BOSA is a smaller agency than BOT with 6800 licensed school administrators, four (4) licensure areas, fewer university preparation programs to review, and fewer disciplinary matters.
- The Legislative Committee has researched states with professional standards boards such as Oregon, Colorado, Maine, and Delaware. These states are much smaller in size with less than half of Minnesota's student, teacher, and administrator populations. With the exception of Oregon, the State Board of Education has the authority over proposed legislation, licensing, ethics, professional development and more. BOSA does not support these models.
- BOSA will continue to work with MDE and BOT as they work towards resolving matters related to the recommendations in the OLA report.

# **BOSA Organizational Structure and Key Facts**

**History:** BOSA is an autonomous body created by the Minnesota Legislature in 2001 with the support of Minnesota educational administration organizations.

**Purpose:** The Board of School Administrators was created to establish and maintain high standards for a quality administrator licensing system and to ensure that the highest quality administrators serve the needs of Minnesota citizens.

The duties of the Board:

- Licensing Minnesota school administrators.
- Approving university administrative preparation programs.
- Setting requirements for continuing education professional development.
- Reviewing disciplinary matters.
- Reviewing and monitoring licensure preparation programs.
- Collecting fees.

**Board Composition:** The board consists of ten board members appointed by the governor. Board members are appointed to four-year terms and must be active in the professional capacity they represent to remain seated on the board. Members of the Board and the professionals they represent are:
