



Regionalization: Where we are today





Types of regionalization




Joint powers

Two existing government bodies enter into an agreement, but retain their own autonomy (See Minn. Stat. 471.59)



Sanitary district

A new entity is formed for the purpose of managing environmental services for the region (See Minn. Stat. 442A.04)



Regional water system

A less formal arrangement in which smaller communities or unincorporated areas are "customers" of a larger utility


Minnesota's unsewered and undersewered communities

Unsewered communities:

No wastewater treatment at all, at the community or individual level

Undersewered communities:

The existing level of collection or treatment is not adequate to protect groundwater
