MN WATER REPORT CARD

At their next 21 meeting, the Environmental Quality Board will be asked to adopt the 2017
 Minnesota Environment and Energy Report Card. The *draft* report can be previewed in the
 EQB's 12/21 meeting <u>packet</u>. Regarding the water section of the draft Report Card, 3 water
 indicators have been selected and the trend for each is about the same (level arrow); overall
 water quality and water use getting an ok status (yellow), but nitrate gets a poor status (red):



ONE WATER

The US Water Alliance has published the <u>One Water Roadmap</u> to make the case for the One Water approach by suggesting key strategies and offering examples where organizations are integrating their management of all water resources in an inclusive and sustainable manner for a prosperous future, with a focus on achieving economic, environmental, and social benefits.



EPA REGROUPS AFTER FLINT

EPA has released its Drinking Water Action Plan with 6 priority action areas:

- 1. Build Capacity for Drinking Water Infrastructure Financing and Management in Low-Income, Small and Environmental Justice Communities
- 2. Next Generation Oversight of the Safe Drinking Water Act
- 3. Strengthen Source Water Protection and Resilience of Drinking Water Supplies
- 4. Proactive Strategy to Address Unregulated Contaminants
- 5. Strengthen Transparency, Public Information, and Risk Communication
- 6. Reducing Lead Risks through the Lead and Copper Rule

On a related note, the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology published this 18 page executive summary of their <u>Report to the President: Science and Technology to Ensure the Safety of the Nation's Drinking Water</u> with 8 recommendations for action.

FLAME RETARDANTS

The International Joint Commission (US and Canada) designated Polybrominated Diphenyl Ethers (used in fire retardants) as chemicals of mutual concern in May 2016 and agreed to develop a binational strategy (e.g., research, monitoring, surveillance, pollution prevention and control, etc.) to address them. This report, Polybrominated Diphenyl Ethers (PBDEs) in the Great Lakes Basin: Reducing Risks to Human Health and the Environment, includes recommendation to advance those goals.
