# **LEGISLATURE**

### **BONDING PROPOSAL**

Governor Dayton proposed a \$1.5B bonding bill that included numerous water projects. The proposal includes \$167M for water infrastructure projects, \$30M for the Reinvest in Minnesota Reserve program to compensate private landowners for permanent conservation easements and establishing wetlands or riparian areas on their lands (which can be used to help implement the buffer program), and \$6.5M for flood risk reduction projects in Halstad, Montevideo, the Cedar River, and the Redpath Impoundment. ### **2016 SUMMIT FINDINGS**

The Governor's Office has posted its 24 page <u>Governor's Water Summit Report 2016</u>, which summarizes input from the 2/16 Summit into these needs:

- Broaden and strengthen Minnesota's water ethic
- Strengthen Minnesota water governance
- Promote efficient water use
- Reduce nitrate contamination in water resources and citizens' exposure to nitrate-contaminated water
- Treat runoff as a resource, not a waste
- Ensure sustained and targeted investment to address critical water needs

### **COST OF WATER SERVICES**

At the end of 2015, Steve Woods (Executive Director of the Freshwater Society) tallied his household costs to see just how inexpensive his water is. He repeated that exercise at the end of 2016 to demonstrate the comparative value we place on household services and water was again near the bottom of the list. In the table Steve published in Freshwater Facets, he only emphasized the cost of his water supply. Replicating his data below, I have highlighted his costs for all 3 water-related utilities: water, wastewater (sanitary sewer) and stormwater (City stormwater fee), so you can compare the relative cost of each. Steve lives in Shoreview, a metro suburb of about 26,000 people. Shoreview extracts groundwater to supply the needs of its residents and businesses; in November 2016, their new water treatment facility began operating to treat iron and manganese. Not surprisingly, the even more highly engineered process to treat wastewater is over twice as expensive as obtaining treated water. It may be surprising for some people to learn that the cost of conveying and treating stormwater is approaching the cost for receiving drinking water. It is also interesting to note that Shoreview raised rates for all three water utilities from 2015 to 2016, but the cost for all 3 utilities is still only 4.4% of Steve's household services budget.

## **SUSTAINABLE AG**

The Alliance for Sustainable Agriculture has released their Field to Market National Indicators Report. Data on <u>Water Quality Indices</u> for MN can be found for the Upper Mississippi River Basin (UMRB) and the Great Lakes Region (GLR). The report notes that "in-stream water quality measurements have not notably improved in recent years. We find encouragement in recent research that has found that continued adoption of conservation practices holds promise to improve water quality outcomes over the long term."
