Parent Support Outreach Program (PSOP)

Goal: Prevent involvement in child welfare and promote family wellbeing.

Serves:

- Families with children aged 10 or younger at risk for child maltreatment
- Most come from screened-out reports

Description:

 Short-term intervention, including case management and flexible funds

Funding:


- \$4 million level since
 2013 when program
 expanded statewide
 - 44% Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP)
 - 56% Expansion funds (state)

Implementation:


- Varies across 87 counties and 2 Initiative Tribes
 - What services offered
 - How funding is spent
 - Where PSOP is housed

Who PSOP Serves


Annual PSOP cases by family, FY 2014-2024

Protective Factors Framework



PSOP Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) Report and Descriptive Report

CQI Report

Goal: Determine what areas of PSOP can be improved to better support families and children.

Qualitative review conducted through interviews

MMB Descriptive Report

Goal: Describe how PSOP is implemented and what outcomes families experience

Descriptive analysis using administrative data – not estimate of cause-and-effect

Key Takeaways

- PSOP meeting goal of preventing involvement, or further involvement, in child welfare
- In counties were PSOP services were contracted out, fewer cases were subsequently involved in child welfare reporting and investigation
- Changes to implementation may improve service delivery for families
- State expansion funding has not increased since initially funded in 2013, though there has been growth in population and the number of families served



2025 Legislation

2025 Legislative Highlights

- Mandated reporter training modifications
- Fentanyl added to MN §152.137
- Modifies definition of "neglect" in Chapter 260E to exclude children remaining in emergency care setting
- Modifies Chapter 142B to provide expanded definitions of related individuals and relative foster care licensing requirements
- Allows appeals under Chapter 256.045 to be filed for alleged maltreatment that occurred in another state or country

2025 Legislative Highlights, continued

- Modifications to ICWA Grant reporting and award limits
- Prevention response to educational neglect reports
- Court reviews for children aging out of foster care
- Expansion of PPPC to allow provision of services related to kinship
- Child welfare IT modernization



Child Maltreatment Reporting Study

Child Maltreatment Reporting Study Legislation

DIRECTION TO COMMISSIONER; CHILD MALTREATMENT REPORTING SYSTEMS REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

The commissioner of children, youth, and families must review current child maltreatment reporting processes and systems in various states and evaluate the costs and benefits of each reviewed state's system. In consultation with stakeholders, including but not limited to counties, Tribes, and organizations with expertise in child maltreatment prevention and child protection, the commissioner must develop recommendations on implementing a statewide child abuse and neglect reporting system in Minnesota and outline the benefits, challenges, and costs of such a transition. By June 1, 2025, the commissioner must submit a report detailing the commissioner's recommendations to the chairs and ranking minority members of the legislative committees with jurisdiction over child protection. The commissioner must also publish the report on the department's website.

Child Maltreatment Reporting Study Design

DCYF contracted with The Improve Group to support and complete the study design by February 2025. The study consisted of the following elements:

1) Reporter Survey:

- a) Online survey to previous and potential reporters
- b) Focused on their experience and the benefits, challenges and resources to a statewide system


2) Listening Sessions:

- a) Gather in depth information
- b) Tribes, counties, and various stakeholders

3) State Research:

- a) Phase One: Broad research of publicly available information for up to twenty states.
- b) Phase Two: Comprehensive research for up to five states, including interviews.

Timeline



Summary of findings: Improve Group Recommendations to DCYF

- Clarify the problem that needs to be addressed.
- Dedicate more time for meaningful engagement.
- Learn more from counties that do intake and screening well.
- Learn more from Minnesota's adult protection system.
- Continue to engage all groups who would interact with a centralized system throughout its design.

Child Fatality and Near Fatality Review



Child Fatality and Near Fatality Review

Child Mortality Review Panel (panel)

The Commissioner shall establish a child mortality review panel to review critical incidents attributed to child maltreatment. The purpose of the panel is to identify systemic changes to improve child safely and well-being and recommend modifications in statute, rule, policy, and procedure.

Local Mortality Review Teams (local review team)

Each county shall establish a multidisciplinary local child mortality review team and shall participate in local critical incident reviews that are based in safety science principals to support a culture of learning.

Critical Incident: a child fatality or <u>near fatality</u> in which maltreatment was known or suspected contributing cause

Local Review Team

Supports local agencies in strengthening collaboration with community partners

Enhances protective measures and response

Fosters a proactive approach to modifying policies, procedures, and practices to improve outcomes for children and families.

DCYF Responsibilities



Provide administrative support to the panel and the chair; including providing the panel with critical incident notices submitted by local child welfare agencies.



Compile and synthesize information for the panel



Draft recommendations and reports for the panel's final approval




Conduct additional information gathering as requested by the panel or local review team.



Conduct or otherwise direct training and consultation

Joint and Local Review



Roles in a Joint Review

27



DCYF will coordinate the joint review with the local review team and the state panel.



The local agency will be responsible for ensuring representation at the review meeting and will have discretion over who attends.



When a worker or supervisor's firsthand experience is needed for the review, DCYF staff will conduct debrief interviews in a constructive and supportive manner, ensuring the process is focused on understanding and improving safety outcomes.



IMPLEMENTATION TIMELINE



MAY 2024

Legislation passed during the 2024 session



Phase-in implementation began with Ramsey and Hennepin Counties

APRIL 2025

Statewide Work Group established and begins meeting monthly

JUNE 2025

Phase-in county contracts signed; \$2.5 million distributed to Ramsey and Hennepin counties



JANUARY 2026

Statewide Work Group Interim Report due to the Legislature



2026

Phase-in county case reports due



2026

DCYF to propose compliance review system



SEPTEMBER 2026

Statewide Work Group final implementation plan due



JANUARY 2027

Statewide implementation begins



JULY 2027

Phase-in implementation with Ramsey and Hennepin counties ends



NOVEMBER 2028

Commissioner issues guidance on county case reviews



OCTOBER 2029

First formal county case review reports due to the African American Well-Being Advisory Council, the Commissioner, and the legislature

Statewide Work Group focus

Members of the Statewide Work group are doing a deep review of assigned sections of the legislation, identifying:

- Statutory recommendations
- Initial implementation needs

The group is also broken down into four smaller Action Teams, which focus on:

- Data
- Legislative changes
- Compliance review
- Phase-in Program

- Aug. 18: Final Statewide Work Group review of recommendations
- **Sept. 1**: Interim report submitted to DCYF
